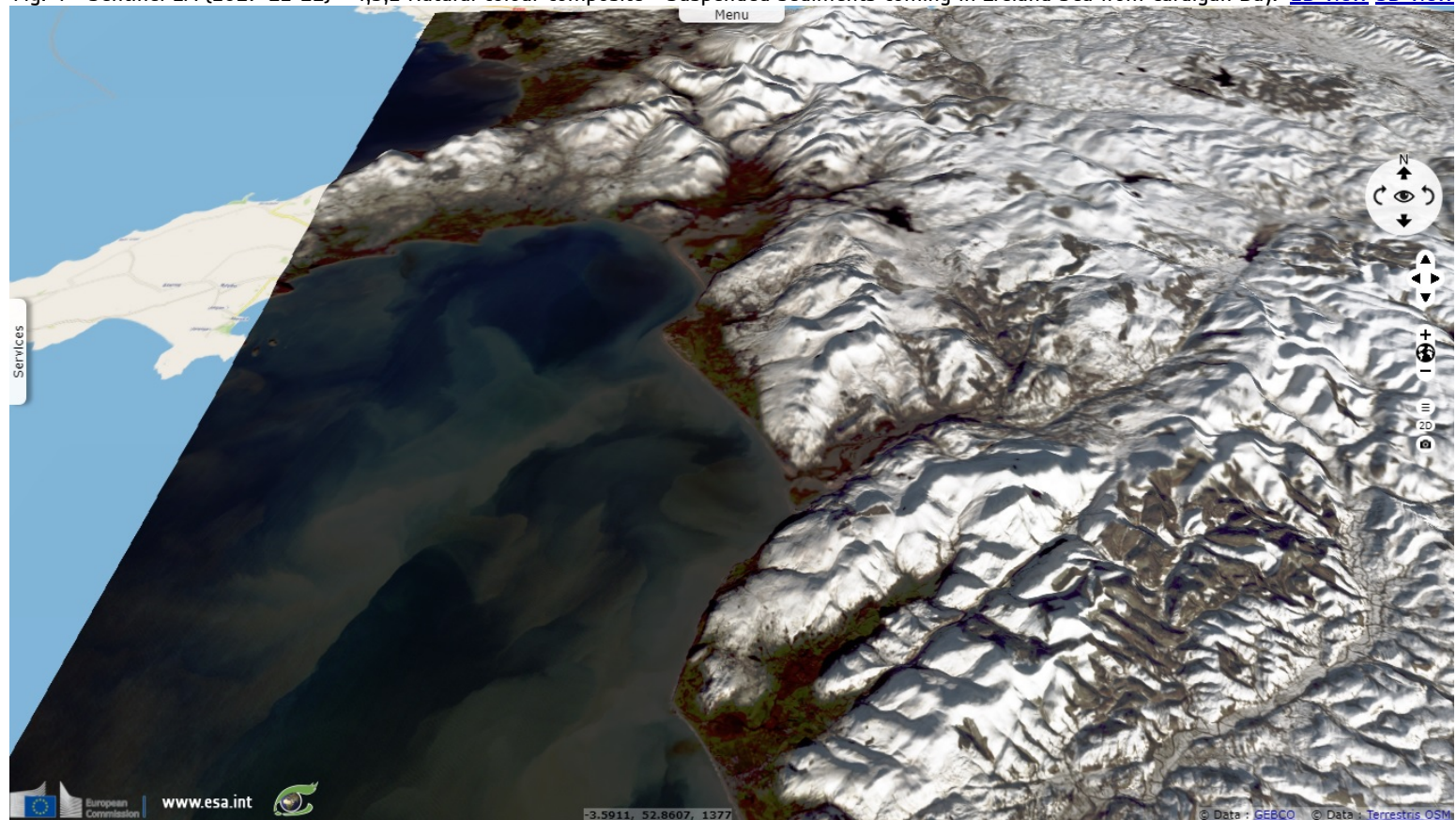


Fig. 3 - S3 (2017-05-02) - 7,6,4 colour composite - Very large phytoplankton bloom during spring.
